

**Hugh Hodgson School of Music- University of Georgia
Head Piano Technician**

Job Summary

The Lead Technician supervises a staff that includes a second technician and part-time help. On the average, the piano technician will require forty hours weekly but not always at regularly set times. Tuning includes concerts and recitals for major performing artists (see pac.uga.edu). The work requires considerable independent judgment and creativity, and is reviewed through observation of results, inspections, and personal conferences.

Minimum Qualifications: Graduation from a standard vocational or high school; considerable experience in the repair, maintenance, and operation of pianos; or any equivalent combination of training and experiences.

Preferred Qualifications: Preference will be given to Registered Piano Technicians at the Examiner Level.

Education, Experience, Licensure, Certification required: Extensive experience in all aspects of piano tuning, repair, maintenance, and rebuilding. Must be skilled in voicing and regulating Steinway grand pianos.

Knowledge, skills, abilities, and/or competencies required to successfully perform work: Must have the ability to tune, maintain, and repair harpsichords.

Physical demands: strength as needed for piano maintenance.

Position will be open until filled. Salary is commensurate with experience.
