Limited-term Lecturer in the Musicology-Ethnomusicology Area

The Hugh Hodgson School of Music at the University of Georgia (UGA) seeks an inspired and engaged educator to teach in a variety of genres/periods within the Musicology/Ethnomusicology program in a limited-term appointment starting Fall 2022. This is a full-time (9 month), benefits eligible appointment with a 100% teaching assignment. This is a one-year appointment, with the possibility of renewal for one or two years, with UGA approval.

Responsibilities:

- Teach a large enrollment undergraduate class on popular music in the USA.
- Teach a large enrollment, undergraduate general studies introduction to music course.
- Teach the1750-present component of the Western music (broadly understood) undergraduate major survey.
- Teach a course in bibliography/research methods for D.M.A. and Ph.D. students.
- Teach a course or courses related to the candidate's main area of research or related topics.

Qualifications:

- A terminal degree in musicology, ethnomusicology, or other allied fields. ABD will be considered if the degree will be completed by August 2022.
- Evidence of strong teaching skills, minimum one year college level teaching.
- Ability to develop and teach course work in the areas of applicant's expertise.
- Demonstrated commitment to diversity, inclusion, and anti-racism.
- Ability to contribute to a dynamic, holistic music program that prepares students for a music career in the 21st century.
- Must be legally eligible to work in the United States at the time of appointment.

To Apply:

Applicants should include a curriculum vitae and cover letter. The c.v. should include contact information for three professional references, who will be contacted later in the process. The cover letter (maximum 2 pages) should address the applicant's ability to fulfill the responsibilities listed above, as well as how their teaching, service, and research/creative activity have supported the success of students from underrepresented backgrounds or identities. Applicants who have not yet had these experiences should explain how their work will further UGA's commitment to diversity. The committee is likely to request a teaching video, sample syllabi, or additional materials at a later point.
